1. Visit a library, historical society, old farm, or historical building: Suggestions include the Lisle Depot Museum, Naper Settlement, Kline Creek Farm, and Cantigny First Division Museum.
2. Naper Settlement: A living history museum tells the story of daily life in Naperville as it changed from a simple frontier outpost to a bustling turn-of-the-century community. With costumed villagers, annual events and special exhibits, you never know what a visit to the Settlement will bring! See [www.napersettlement.org](http://www.napersettlement.org) for details.
3. Lisle Depot Museum: The Museums at Lisle Station Park provide visitors the opportunity to learn about the heritage and culture of 19th century Northern Illinois. Settled in 1832, the life of this agricultural community soon revolved around the railroad depot and the area became known as Lisle Station. 4. Kline Creek Farm (Winfield – DuPage Forest Preserve). Kline creek was a surprise hit with the kids. Sheep shearing, corn shucking, bees, and docents in period costumes. 5. The Cantigny First Division Museum has an elaborate multimedia WW I exhibit and a large collection of army tanks. Our Scouts enjoyed crawling on top of them. Cantigny allows this, but just be careful. This is the real thing. Note that Scouts in uniform get in free at Cantigny. 6. See a fire station: The Naperville Fire Station at the corner of Warrenville and Yackley will be glad to arrange a tour for your Den. See the City of Naperville's web site for contact information. The Lisle-Woodridge Fire District has put on an outstanding fire safety demonstration for our Pack meetings. 7. Visit the Police: The Lisle Police department welcomes Scouts. See the village website for details on how to schedule a tour. 8. Be sure to check out Naperville's unique Safety Town. It is a scale model village next door to the Police station on Aurora Avenue. In addition to the CSI program for Bears, they also have programs for Wolves. Be advised, Safety Town programs fill up fast. 9. Attend an amateur or professional sporting event: Our Pack organizes several events during the year. The DuPage Dragons are at Benedictine University. They are college all-stars and are very good. Fireworks, running the bases, etc. Both the Dragons and Cougars have free parking and are great choices for baseball fans. 10. Visit a television station, radio station, or newspaper. Both the College of Du Page and North Central College radio stations welcome Cub Scouts. See [www.northcentralcollege.edu](http://www.northcentralcollege.edu) and <http://home.cod.edu/>
11. Take a hike: The Morton Arboretum's "Big Rock" trail works well. Adults pay, but kids get in free, and the Children's Garden and Maze are outstanding. The latter are best enjoyed in the Summer. 12. Don't miss the Willowbrook Wildlife Center. The Center is run by the Du Page Forest Preserve District and specializes in rehabilitating injured wild animals. It also has an extensive public outreach program, including activities specifically designed for Cub Scouts. The boys can see Bald Eagles, hawks, owls, and get hands on time with snakes and the Center's pet rats. Highly recommended.
